


EDITOR'S LETTER

CHARLIE STRAIGHT

Inducted October 5, 1986
Born April 18, 1915 – Died April 7, 1997

Charlie Straight started his musical career at the age of 11 years old in his hometown of Okmulgee, Oklahoma. His next door neighbor, Joe Woods, gave Charlie a guitar that was all busted at the seams and Charlie wanted to play so badly that he glued it all together and, by the age of 13, he was working with Bud Fuller and the Saddle Pals. At the age of 14, Charlie and the Saddle Pals had a radio show for Doc Gaines Butane Co. on a local radio station—the call letters escape his memory. He continued to play at local parties and picnics and radio shows until age 15 when his Dad “Asa” bought him a new Custom Craft guitar for \$22 (electric, of course) and Charlie had an amplifier made out of an old radio. He sold his old guitar that he had repaired over and over for the giant sum of \$2.00 with which he bought a new set of Black Diamond strings for \$1.25. He still uses the same good string today (the price slightly inflated).

By this time Charlie Straight had been exposed to several types and styles of music. Some of his favorites were: Bob Wills, Benny Goodman, and Spade Cooley. Charlie worked with most of the “Texas Playboys”, including Tommy Duncan, Luke Wills, Joe Andrews, Glen Duncan, Billie Carter, Truitt Cunningham, Billie Briggs, and several others. All these bands had good guitar players such as Eldon Shamblin, Junior Bernard, Charlie Christian, Jimmy Wyble. From these players and his own creativeness he developed his unique style of playing Western Swing music with a Jazz Blues flavor. At the age of 16, Charlie was working with the Oklahoma State College “Stardusters”, a Dixieland society band playing all the old standards and, of course, some country and western music as is required if you live in Oklahoma.

At age 17, he enlisted in the service so he could get the GI Bill of Rights and attend college. He was like everyone else, shipped immediately overseas. Then he was assigned to special services and worked in a 17 piece orchestra attached to the service with country and western players at the NCO and Officers Clubs. Charlie returned home at the age of 19 and completed his high school education at Preston, Oklahoma, where he met Sid Turner

DICK FLOYD

Inducted October 6, 2019
Born February 3, 1931-Died August 12, 2011



Dick Floyd, the cigar-chomping, trash-talking Democrat who represented a portion of the South Bay for nearly two decades and authored legislation that led to California’s landmark motorcycle law, has died. He was 80.

Floyd died Thursday at his home in Sacramento after a battle with diabetes. A nephew, Brian Floyd, confirmed his death.

“He had his adversaries, like we all do in life, but he loved people,” said Brian Floyd, a Republican political consultant who works in Sacramento. “You never had to doubt where he stood or what he stood for. He enjoyed being a legislator and crafting laws.”

Richard E. “Dick” Floyd was born Feb. 3, 1931, in Philadelphia to Herbert and Viola Floyd, the third of six children. Shortly after his birth, the Floyd family moved to Long Beach, where his father recovered at a naval hospital from critical injuries suffered in the Pacific Theater during World War II.

The Floyd family eventually settled in a home on Prairie Avenue in what is now Lawndale. Floyd attended Leuzinger High School before enlisting in the U.S. Army. He served in combat during the Korean War, and earned a Purple Heart after suffering a gunshot wound through his left shoulder. To regain dexterity in his shoulder, he spent much of his free time building model airplanes with his brothers.

Floyd first became interested in politics after visiting the Torrance Democratic Woman’s Club, and served on the staff of late South Bay Sen. Ralph Dills from 1966 to 1980. Floyd was first elected to the state Assembly to represent the 53rd District in 1980.

He represented the 55th Assembly district from 1996 to 2000. During his time in Sacramento, Floyd represented Lawndale, Hawthorne, Gardena, Watts and portions of Compton and Long Beach. During his years in the Assembly, he was known as a champion of gamblers, the liquor industry and organized labor.

He also aggressively advocated for war veterans, writing legislation that led to the creation of the Southern California Veterans Home for homeless

(Piano player and life time friend). Charlie worked with Willard Franke's Western Band in Okmulgee while working on his high school diploma. He visited his sister, Mourene, in Pauls Valley, Oklahoma, where he met another life time friend, Dick Stubbs. Then Charlie, Sid, and Dick moved to Odessa, Texas, and played anywhere there was a job available. Then Charlie and Dick moved to Albuquerque, N.M and on to Santa Fe, N.M., and then to Dallas, Texas, where Charlie met two more lifetime friends, Leon Rhodes (guitar player extraordinaire) and Johnny Lytle (Charlie's favorite fiddle player).

Charlie made Dallas, Texas, his home base and it was there he worked with Marvin Montgomery and the famous Texas band, "the Lightcrust Dough-boys". He also worked with Jim and Bill Boyd, Georgia Slim, and Tex Ritter. Charlie and Johnnie Gimble worked together in Dallas with the "Aunt Jemimah Bandwagon". During that same period of time, Charlie worked as a staff band member of the "Big 'D' Jamboree" show along with his buddies, Leon Rhodes, George McCoy, and Tex Raye. Almost all of the big country stars including "Elvis" appeared at one time or another on the Big 'D' supported by Charlie and all of the Big 'D' regulars. There were a couple of bands Charlie Straight enjoyed working with from Oklahoma: Merl Lindsay and "The Oklahoma Night Riders", a real swinging 10 piece western band featuring Jimmy Young (fiddle) from Amarillo, Texas, and Roddy Bristol (concert violinist and trombone), Also, Leon McAuliffe and the Cimmaron Boys with the great Sol Gamboa (drums). Charlie and Leon's band toured through Canada with Grandpa Jones, Porter Waggoner, and the Grand Ole Opry Show.

Charlie moved from Dallas back to Oklahoma for a short time working with the "Al Good Orchestra" in Oklahoma City and then toward California (Charlie was also in the horse business) where he met another lifetime Christian friend, Bob Kelly (Indiana Hoosier) and band leader Harold Hensley, the west coast superman of the fiddle. While living in California, Charlie was most pleased to work with Truitt Cunningham (vocalist from the Bob Wills band) and

Noel Boggs, one of the all time great steele guitar players from the Spade Cooley band, and also Tiny Moore, the legend of the hot Mandolin players.

Charlie considered himself very fortunate to have had the pleasure of working at Disneyland with the famous "Banjo Kings" headed up by the notorious "Little Red" (Jimmy Blount) of Las Vegas, Nevada, formerly with Louis Prima and Keely Smith.

Disneyland auditioned 55 banjo players for that job and Charlie was picked first and then helped to select the other two banjo players, Bernie Smith from Louisville, Kentucky and Pat Terry from Boston, Mass, to complete the group. It was at Disneyland where Charlie met another lifetime friend, Smiley Wilson, Fiddle and trombone. During all of these happenings, Charlie and his family maintained a "Horse trading business". All of his children are: Red (Lead and bass guitars) won the Wrangler Country Showdown in Las Vegas and California, Cheryl (Guitar, Banjo, and singer), Davy (bass guitar and singer), Valerie (piano and multiple PRCA Rodeo Queen). All of the family are expert horse trainers and equine specialists in the art of trading horses, this includes his wife, Jan Straight. Jan also plays the violin and studies music with Harold Hensley, she deeply admires his versatile playing. Charlie has his own Family Band since all of the kids are musically talented. Sometimes they played on the stage with him. The Straight Family played together in Las Vegas, Nevada, at Caesar's Palace where they were billed as "The Texas-Oklahoma-Prune pickers".

From sunny California, Charlie and Jan Straight decided to move to the entertainment capital of the world, Los Vegas.

During Charlie's musical career, he learned to play several instruments: Guitar, Steel guitar, Banjo, bass, fiddle, and Trombone as well as being a good vocalist and MC. His first chords were learned from his mother, Mазzie Straight. Evelyn, Mrs Oral Roberts, taught him music theory. Being "multitalented" as he is sometimes called, Charlie Straight, according to Mark Tully, President of the Las Vegas Musicians Union, has worked more music jobs, casuals, club dates, parties, conventions, political rallies, than any other musician in the Las

Vegas area.

Before and after moving to Las Vegas, Charlie worked with Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck, Mr Magoo, Tony Curtiss, Jane Russell, Lola Falana, Danny Thomas, The Royal Dixie Jazz Band, and many other Las Vegas Stars. He also had the Charlie Straight Orchestra Service in Las Vegas which hires a variety of musicians for a wide field of entertainment.

Charlie says thanks to all of his family, his father Asa, Mother Mазzie, Brothers Ace and Kenneth, sisters Mourene and Nancy all of whom played music and sang a lot of gospel music which Charlie thinks played an important part to his musical talents. He also thanks all of the many friends he met along the way during his musical career and hopes in his small way in this big world he has contributed to someone's happiness.

Willie Nelson said he used to watch Charlie play the guitar in Dallas, Texas and would try to steal all of his "hot licks" but Charlie said he should have been watching to see what Willie was doing and maybe they could both be big stars!

Charlie Straight has set a good example for all of his children. His goal has been music, health, and happiness. Charlie says if you are happy and healthy, you are a "millionaire". He also has a quote from his dad "ASA" Straight, "In God we trust, all others pay cash". Charlie plans to retire on a horse ranch some day, but he will always play music as long as he continues to make folks happy.

Charlie Straight is gone, but his wife Jan and his family will continue to spread this same good will and happiness throughout the world with music.
